



Spanish Plainchant Publications to 1601

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MUSICOLOGISTS UNANIMOUSLY acknowledge the paramount role played by plainchant in Renaissance liturgical polyphony. Nonetheless, they have tended to shun “impure” Renaissance sources in their discussions, favoring instead “pure” Solesmes plainchant versions. In explanation for their neglect, Renaissance plainchant sources, except for incunabula, have not been anywhere comprehensively catalogued.

The present catalogue of pre-1601 Spanish imprints containing plainchant took wings as a class project at the Real Conservatorio Superior de Música de Madrid, where I occupy the plainchant chair. During its preparation I have profited greatly from the investigations of a bibliographer who dedicated his entire life to liturgical books, Antonio Odriozola. A decade after his accidental death in December 1987 appeared his *Catálogo de Libros Litúrgicos Españoles y Portugueses, impresos en los siglos XV y XVI* (Museo de Pontevedra, 1996).

Cathedral archives from Seville to Ayacucho, Cuzco, and Lima, from Toledo to Bogotá, Mexico City and Puebla to Quito, house hundreds of handwritten, atlas-size *cantorales* containing plainchant. As exquisite masterpieces of visual art the illuminations in these choirbooks have occasionally attracted scholarly attention. For one example, the Bogotá periodical *Bolívar*, 45 (November–December 1955), contains at pages 1076–1129 Gabriel Giraldo Jaramillo’s “Francisco de Páramo, Miniaturista y Calí-

grafo Santañé del Siglo XVII” with an appendix of eighteen black and white plates. The first plate is a facsimile of the colophon to Choirbook IV (this contains Christmas chants): *Este Libro lo escribio Fran^{co} de Paramo por mandado del Ill^{mo} Señor Don Bartholome Lobo Guerrero, Arzobispo deste Nuebo Reino, año de 1.606*. The rest of the plates chosen from the total of 32 (originally 30) plainchant monsters copied on vellum between 1606 and 1608 show Páramo’s skill as an illuminator; the second plate also includes the music for the Low Sunday Mass introit.

But an article or two on visuals does not palliate the supreme ignorance that reigns concerning music in plainchant sources extant in Spain, Portugal, and Latin America. The disregard for the music in the fifteenth- through seventeenth-century Iberian world plainchant sources manifests itself painfully in the extreme, when John R. Bryden and David G. Hughes’s two-volume *An Index of Gregorian Chant* (Harvard University Press, 1969) is consulted. Not one Spanish manuscript or printed plainchant source of any century is indexed. Samuel Rubio in his monograph *Las melodías gregorianas de los “libros corales” del Monasterio de Escorial* (El Escorial, 1982) demonstrated how different from widely dispersed melodies elsewhere can be Spanish variants, none of which can be deduced from Bryden and Hughes.

The list of imprints given below includes only

fifteenth- and sixteenth-century imprints. As thorough as was Antonio Odriozola, he kept constantly adding new typewritten cards deposited at the Juan March Foundation, in justification of the award given him in 1960. Editors Julián Martín Abad and Francesc X Altés i Agulló have had the foresight to publish facsimiles of Odriozola's added cards. Meanwhile, however, the purpose and destination of any printed plainchant book must be understood if its melodic contents are to be rightly comprehended and evaluated.

PLAINCHANT MANUSCRIPT AND PRINTED CHOIRBOOKS IN SPANISH CATHEDRALS

Along with other fifteenth- and sixteenth-century changes, their printing altered the idea of what constituted a liturgical book and lent it another function. As is well known, the first printed plainchant books, aptly described by Michel Huglo in his *Les livres de chant liturgique* (Turnhout: Brepols, 1988) were modeled on current manuscript plainchant sources. But in the long course of time, liturgical books suffered certain changes to meet the varying demands of churches served by religious orders and by diocesan secular clergy. In my *Historia de la música española desde los orígenes hasta el ars nova* (Madrid: Alianza, 2nd ed., 1988), pages 239–42, I lengthily described source manuscripts which served as models for the first printed plainchant books, and therefore desist from repeating myself here.

During the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries Spain witnessed strategic religious reforms enforced upon both secular and religious clergy, thanks to the Catholic Kings' impetus throughout their combined reigns. New ascetic fervor permeated Spanish society everywhere at the close of the so-called Middle Ages. Exact observance of all religious precepts—especially liturgical obligations—paralleled a new economic abundance that made possible the completion of many Gothic churches and cathedrals, construction of which had begun in some instances more than two centuries previously. As one result, more space became available for required liturgical functions that became constantly more solemn and formal, thus matching the increased religious fervor and private prayers inculcated by the *devotio moderna*. In cathedrals and collegiate churches the middle nave

spaces were enclosed, while in churches served by the religious orders the back tribune was closed off, thus separating the officiating clergy from other worshipers. The ornate choir stalls whose lateral tribunes contained one or two organs were grouped around a choirbook stand in the center of the enclosure. The choirbook stand with four faces gave the beneficed clergy, singers, and instrumentalists circling it their opportunity to sing and play under the choirmaster's watchful direction. Placed on the central choirbook stand were the enormous plainchant books copied with the same solicitude devoted to the rest of the liturgical furniture that included paintings and sculpture, altarpieces with scenes that incited to piety, as did the altars and chapels in the wings.

In this ambience the antiquated plainchant manuscripts gave way to printed books with notes legible at a distance. In processions, portable manuscripts were replaced by printed plainchant manuals. Not until the Tridentine decrees took effect did liturgical uniformity prevail throughout Spain. The papal-approved Breviary was first printed in 1568, Missal in 1570, Pontifical in 1596, Bishops' Ceremonial in 1600, Ritual in 1614. These documents prescribed fixed texts, but not uniform music—although musical norms were dictated.

Pope Gregory XIII's desire in 1577 to unify plainchant usages under Palestrina's supervision was stymied by Fernando de las Infantas's intervention, authorized by Philip II. Las Infantas's occult motive for intervening can be explained. At El Escorial and elsewhere throughout Spain great sums were being spent to copy locally approved traditional plainchant melodies into lavish choirbooks. To discard these in favor of plainchants favored at Rome, even those authorized in the papal chapel, spelled economic tribulation throughout Spain. Delaying the publication of any Roman models approved by the pope, gave the numerous diverse ecclesiastical entities in Spain their opportunity to cling to their own traditional usages, and permitted the bishops, for instance, Alfonso de Gregorio at Saragossa, to authorize publication as late as 1596 and 1598 of antiphoners *De Sanctis* and *De Tempore*. Meanwhile the long anticipated Roman Gradual did not reach print until 1614, and it even then carried no papal brief obligating its usage throughout the whole of catholic Christendom.



TYPES OF LITURGICAL BOOKS

Here follows an annotated list of the fourteen types of liturgical books containing plainchant that were published in the Spanish peninsula before 1601.

1. *Missal*. The musical portions consisted chiefly of the prefaces and intonations of the Gloria in excelsis. Holy Week music frequently included intonations for the rite of the Adoration of the Cross, the Good Friday office, and Holy Saturday's dawn. Sometimes the music for the Ite missa est intoned by the deacon was also included.

2. *Manuale Sacramentorum*. This all-music miscellany, designed for parish priests, combined chants sung at Mass and during the daily office. As a rule it also included the ceremonial music for baptisms, marriages, funerals, burial offices, and other exceptional events. Examples of this frequently published type of mixture began appearing in 1501 and 1508, when Fadrique Aleman de Basilea published his *Manuale Burgense* and continued unabated past mid-century, until in 1566 Juan de Cánova published his *Manipulus Conquensis*. All these manuals included plentiful printed plainchant.

3. *Ordinarium*. A book thus entitled often contained the same music as a *Manuale Sacramentorum*. However, it might contain also the sung and/or read texts of the daytime office, expanded occasionally with matins and nocturns texts.

4. *Processionarium*. Containing responsories, antiphons, and hymns, processions were strictly musical volumes with a fixed repertory. After terce on Sundays and feast days, the religious and secular clergy in cathedrals and collegiate churches processed throughout the cloister; special processions occurred on Palm Sundays and Rogation days. Each procession involved its proper responsories; hymns were also sung, and when the clergy stopped before a statue or altar in the cloister, antiphons and relevant prayers were sung. Since music hymnals are quite rare, the melodies of certain hymns must be sought elsewhere, especially in processional. Printers often included also psalm intonations, burial offices, and even at times a brief plainsong instructor for the use of novices, as for instance did Mathias Gast in the processional published at Salamanca in 1563. At the end of the Ungut-Polono processional printed at Seville in 1494 folios 67-69

contain the Christmas and Epiphany chants and gospel genealogies.

5. *Intonarium*. Normally containing the intonations grouped by tones for psalms and hymns, the type of book, when destined not only for the use of parish clergy but also for lay choirs in cathedrals and collegiate churches, might also be called a *Manuale Chori*—as was for example called the Toledo intonarium published at Alcalá by Brocar in 1515. At times intonariums opened with a short plainsong treatise in Latin or Spanish, instances being those printed at Saragossa by Pedro Bernuz in 1543 and 1548.

This type of intonarium served more for school and practice use than for employment in the liturgy.

6. *Manuale Chori*. A music book thus entitled contained all the verbal instructions, psalm and hymn intonations and most frequently sung liturgical pieces required by a plainchanter. Sometimes its contents duplicated those of a processional, as for example the *Processionale* published at Salamanca by Juan de Cánova in 1557. As much a school textbook as a liturgical publication, a *Manuale Chori* was in general acquired by churches boasting a choral program, and as such was deemed either a treatise or an art of plainchant or an intonarium. (See Ismael Fernández de la Cuesta's "A propósito de un *Manuale Chori* of 1539" published in *De Música Hispana et aliis*, Universidad de Santiago de Compostela, 1990, pages 263-74.)

7. *Himnario*. An exceptional type, containing as a rule no more than hymn intonations, and therefore comparable with an intonarium; also, hymnals could occasionally find their way into such other books as a passioner.

8. *Pasionario*. Such a book contains the music for the passion recitations sung during Holy Week. As José Vicente González Valle brilliantly showed in his 1974 Munich Ludwig-Maximilian-Universität doctoral dissertation, *Die Tradition des Liturgischen Passionsvortrags in Spanien* and in its revised Spanish version published at Saragossa by the Institución Fernando el Católico in 1995, the formulas for the reciting of the passion narratives varied widely throughout the peninsula. Passioners occasionally included also the *Pregón Pascual "Exsultate"* and the genealogies read at Christmas and Epiphany.

9. *Psalterium*. In as much as the 150 psalms have traditionally been designated for liturgical use, for

each psalm is specified an appropriate antiphon. Even today monastic breviaries begin with the *Psalterium feriale*. According to the Benedictine rule, the 150 psalms are sung in numerical order from beginning to end each week ("psalterio currente"). Like medieval codices containing the book of psalms, printed psalters customarily included hymns and also the *De Beata* and burial offices—an example being the Toledan psalter published at Alcalá by Brocar in 1515.

10. *Diurnale*. A book thus titled contained the daily festive offices from Lauds to Compline. At times a diurnale included likewise music for matins and for special solemnities. By order of Cardinal Guillermo de Croy, archbishop of Toledo, Brocar published at Alcalá in 1519 a *Diurnale dominicale seu Ordinarium secundum usum alme ecclesie Toletane*. In the introduction Francisco de Mendoza, who was then Gobernador General of the archdiocese, recalled that only this one liturgical book needed being now printed, since all the others used in the liturgy—psalter, missal, passioner, intonarium, common of saints, and so forth, had already been published.

Cum vero iam Psalterium, Missale, Intonarium, Passionale, Sanctorum commune, rei divine Officiorum absolvisset, invidit fortuna illius ingentis ceptis, et quod solum restabat diurnarum horarum opus duplex, alterum quod ad sanctorum festa pertinebat, interceptus morte in medio imprimendi apparatu reliquit.

Therefore it seems that the editor in his prologue explaining the purpose of the *Dirunale* offered in addition a conspectus of the different types of liturgical books then in use. Despite the *Diurnale* title, the two volumes—one for feast days, the other for saints' days—includes also the music for the *night*

offices of Christmas, Epiphany, Easter, and Corpus Christi, precisely because the music for these and other major feasts was sung even in small churches not owning other choirbooks.

11. *Officarium*. Books thus entitled with generous music for the Office corresponded to what is now called the Office Antiphoner (chants for the day, the night, or both); with music for the Mass they equalled what is now called the *Gradual*.

12. *Graduale*. Although present-day *graduals* contain chants sung at Mass, the *Graduale Officarium Dominicale* published at Granada by Juan Varela de Salamanca ca. 1507 seems to be the only compound title *graduale* of its period containing chants for the Mass.

13. *Antifonario*. Antiphoners contained the divine office chants for feast days. Juan Varela de Salamanca published an *Antiphonarium Officarium Dominicale* at Granada in 1508 as a complement to the just listed *Graduale* of ca. 1507. As late as 1596 and 1598 Archbishop Alfonso de Gregorio commissioned Pascual Pérez's publication at Saragossa of saints' days and feast days antiphoners.

14. *Pontificale*. Liturgists call a book of rites pertaining exclusively to bishops—such as ordinations, church dedications, Maundy Thursday consecrations of Holy Oil and Chrism—a *pontifical*. However books containing exclusively the *ordo* and *ordines* for bishops' ceremonies do not always bear the title *pontificale*.

The repositories for the plainchant publications listed in the catalogue that concludes this article are identified by siglas, first for Spanish locations, second with siglas for foreign locations. Spanish spellings for Spanish cities prevail (Zaragoza, not Saragossa).
